Fact 1	Southend Pier was taken over by the Royal Navy on Friday 25th August 1939.
Fact 2	Captain J. P. Champion. C.B.E., D.S.O, R.N, became N.C.S. Officer, Thames and Medway, on 14th October 1939, and in December assumed the role of Naval Officer-in-Command (NOIC).
Fact 3	A.P Herbert in his book, The War Story of Southend Pier reported that 84,297 ships that sailed from Southend between September 1939 and VE-Day.
Fact 4	The first convoys of the war sailed from HMS Leigh on 7 th September 1939 - F.N.1 to Methil on the Firth of Forth, and O.A.1 to Sierra Leone.
Fact 5	For the first few months of the war, R.N.V.R ratings ran the switchboard, and a Voluntary Messenger organisation was provided by local Sea Scouts.
Fact 6	The Pier Trains covered over 300,000 track miles, carrying 1,500,000 Service men and women, including many sick, wounded and survivors. A number of the train coaches were especially adapted for stretcher cases.
Fact 7	Small ships sailed from Southend Pier during the evacuation of Dunkirk in 1940, the skippers were paid £4 and crew members were paid £3 for their service.
Fact 8	Landing Craft sailed from HMS Leigh for the D-Day landings, both Landing Craft (Tank) and Landing Craft (Personnel) had trained in the Thames and River Crouch for the operation.
	Landing Craft (Personner) had trained in the maries and kiver croden for the operation.
Close:	HMS Leigh was 'paid off' on 15th October 1945 and handed back to the people of Southend-on-Sea.
